for her mother. Without a moment's hesitation the woman quickly went to her aid. While talking softly, she picked up Willow and cuddled her close, trying to help comfort her. Upon arrival to our shelter, Willow was signed over by this caring woman and immediately taken to be examined by the vet. During this examination it was brought to our attention that Willow was actually blind. Can you imagine how scared she was?

The staff at the shelter prepared an intake cage with blankets, food and water. Still crying out for her mother, she was gently placed on the soft blanket and guided to the food. Fortunately she was fully weaned and once she got a smell of that food, she ate like there was no tomorrow.

With a full belly and a warm place to settle down, Willow seemed to sense she was safe and with a sigh of contentment, she quickly fell asleep. After much love and care Willow has been adopted and renamed "Jovie."

Animal Cruelty Results

“The Dobermans”

July 4, 2012, it was the smell that alerted the neighbors, a smell that grew over the course of a year, becoming so bad that people couldn’t leave their homes. They worried that the woman who lived in the house with the odor had died. A 911 call dispatched The Humane Society and NY State Police, and what they found led to the end of a terrible, heartbreaking secret. The woman, presenting herself as an animal rescuer and rehabber, had a house full of animals - most of them dead. There were 16 dogs, all Dobermans, 13 of them still alive. The dogs had been locked in crates, living ankle deep in their own feces; they had ammonia-burned skin under matted coats. All were emaciated with open wounds; some weighed less than 40lbs.

The Owner was charged with 16 counts of felony aggravated animal cruelty. All the surviving animals went to the Broome County Humane Society.

The dogs were bathed, fed and received medical care. All of the Dogs, with the exception of Storm, were adopted fairly quickly. Several months had passed before a loving family came to the Shelter to meet him. Storm was the perfect fit for this family!
